Why Local Green Deals?

Governance innovation: responding to the implementation gap



(Partly) done:

- ✓ Low-hanging fruits
- ✓ Actions with direct control, e.g. on city property / public organisations

Still to do:

- ☐ Actions without direct control, i.e. industries' and businesses' footprint
- ☐ Private households' footprint
- National government-controlled infrastructures or sector-policies

EC industrial policy

European industrial strategy:

"[T]he business case for the green and digital transition is stronger than ever. In the medium-term, all business activity will need to become sustainable and the disruption of many traditional patterns caused by COVID-19 will shake up old habits and therefore will accelerate the green transition." (COM2021/350: 5)


A Green Deal Industrial Plan for the net-zero age:

"[T]he net-zero industry in Europe will play a vital role in **transforming the continent** into a green economy - delivering prosperity in the EU and leading globally both on technology and on combatting climate change and environmental pollution" ...

"Public funding can **crowd-in private investments**, but it will not be sufficient to close the investment-gap needs. For successful net-zero transformation, we need vast amounts of private-sector financing" (COM2023/62 final: 14)







LGD Principle 7:

'DEALS'

LGDs need to ensure implementation and action with long-lasting impacts. There might be value in using city-led initiatives to kick start co-production, co-design and co-innovation approaches. Those actions will pave the way for long-term and systematic change in the way that the city works with stakeholders to implement their sustainability policies. Ultimately, LGDs should go beyond public-led initiatives. Once the city has established connections, trust and working practices with local stakeholders, there will be value in formalising their collaboration. A core element of LGDs is developing and implementing agreements (or "deals") to cooperate. These agreements should clearly identify the key actions that each stakeholder commits to lead, the support offered by all of the signatories and timeframes for delivery. Such agreements should be reviewed and updated regularly, to maintain momentum when implementing the LGD.

Levers:

- Using publicly-owned assets (e.g. land or companies) to pilot collaborative projects
- Unlocking logistics, financial, regulatory and/or advisory support for local stakeholders driving forward sustainable initiatives
- Using written agreements to formalise long-term actions and partnerships


Umeå climate roadmap



Description of ambition and context

This section is for setting the scene, starting with a general introduction about the overall scope of the deal partners and more information about the context.

In Aalborg Municipality the main agenda is to reduce CO₂-emissions. Therefore, this section regards national and local climate policies and targets.

In Amsterdam Municipality the main agenda is to support the transition of the City's economy to an economy with wellbeing at its core. This focus is on multiple value creation and sustainable and social issues. Therefore, this section is broader with local and national policies and targets in play around CO_2 -emissions, circular economy and inclusion and inequality with topics like social economy and inclusive employment.

Current state of affairs

This section is for describing the partner and its main professions. It can contain the baseline for the partner regarding the topic of the Local Green Deal; what is the partners current sustainable impact, what have been done so far, and what are the partners strategy and targets within the given topic.

Commitment

This section is to describe the level of commitment and an alignment of expectations for the collaboration. This could include monitoring, responsibilities, deadlines, renewal of the deal, communication etc.

This section is for administrating any jurisdictions or legal aspects regarding the collaboration.








What we discovered?

LGD STEP 1-2 as an EVENT

By undersigning all steps, you'll gradually develop your LGD.

USEFUL TO EVERYONE OWNED BY COMMUNITY





6. First sign

After this first draft the LGD steering group should undersign the deal.

a. Metro city Sign

The Metropolitan city, with alignment granted by the continuous collaboration of its SG member, should sign the deal too

7. Other signs (before realisation)

Viccho's format previews a gradual inclusion of many other stakeholders from the local community or from a particular category of stakeholder essential to reach project goals. These stakeholders will be included gradually through different thematic meetings. At the end of each meeting new stakeholders should be asked if they want to be part of the process signing the project. All the relevant signs should be collected before the output physical realisation part.


a. City metro seal of excellence

If project goals are met and all KPIs are checked, MEtropolitan City can give its Seal of Approval to all the experience.





ALLIANCE Local Green Deals Recommendations to EC

Policy

- Support the development of **common tools** such as platforms for LGD management that all cities working on I GDs will need.
- Align LGDs as policy instrument with **CSRD** and **ESG** reporting.
- Connect support for SMEs to the social economy action plan and the ambition to transition business models towards sustainability and local economic welfare creation (cf. proximity economy in the EC industrial strategy).
- Encourage synergies of LGD projects with the Cities-Mission and Horizon Europe projects.

Funding (SMP-COSME)

- **Continue** funding for the LGD approach to implement the European Green Deal.
- Funding instruments should be **directed directly to cities** where the solutions for green transition are created.
- Allow for more flexible funding mechanisms such as matchmaking for funding for cities to be able to support local initiatives (by NGOs, SMEs).
- **Increase the budget** from the €200.000 to €1.000.000 per project and set the duration at 18-24 months.



ALLIANCE Local Green Deals Recommendations to EC

Types of action

- Cities from less developed ecosystems still need capacity support to further develop their LGDs.
- Encourage actions that engage SMEs with local, national, and international peers, municipalities and target groups.
- Systematic and more active dialogue between EU institutions and the cities should be reinforced.

Scope of action

Support should be provided to cities in all the areas of holistic sustainability to promote systemic transition, for example in the areas of reducing and preventing inequalities, segregation, social exclusion and urban poverty, energy efficiency of buildings and energy transition as well as reducing emissions from transport.
